

Simple present

We use the present simple to express habits, facts, thoughts and feelings.

It is also used with general statements and actions that are repeated.

Form of Simple Present

It is formed with the base form of the verb, except the third person singular where you have to add an "s".

Key words: often, always, never, every day, month,..., usually, sometimes, generally, normally, rarely, seldom, whenever, on Mondays, Tuesdays,...

NOTE:

- **es** after - s / - ch / - sh

Examples: passes - watches - finishes

- **ies** if there is a consonant before the y

Examples: study - studies / carry - carries / but play - plays

do - does / go - goes / have – has

Negative

Subject + do not + infinitive without to

Ex :They don't work at the weekend.

John doesn't live in Manchester. (doesn't = does not)

Interrogative

- We use do and does to make questions with the present simple. We use does for the third person singular (she/he/it) and do for the others.
- Ex : Does ahmed play football?
- Do you know how to bake a pie?
